Atencio's latest endeavor, an investigative podcast titled "Lost in Panama," investigates issue of femicide in Latin America. The podcast ranks among Apple's top 10 podcasts during its release week.

The event includes a panel discussion featuring distinguished Latinx leaders, with panelists that include Germán Chiriboga, program director of Health Equity and Storytelling at UMass Medical School; Elena Quiroz-Livanis, chief of staff and

assistant commissioner of Academic Policy and Student Success at Massachusetts Department of Higher Education; and Dr. Lorna Rivera, director of the Mauricio Gastón Institute for Latino Community Development & Public Policy at UMass Boston.
