Academic Affairs plans to focus on 4 broad areas to further student success at QCC:

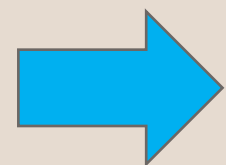
- Enhance success rates of our online students
- Develop consistent SLOs across different sections of the same course
- Improve retention
- Close the achievement gaps



Improving outcomes for online students

- Disaggregated data shows a significant difference between online and traditional, on-ground courses. Especially given the increasing demand for online courses, the college is aware it needs to address this gap. Similarly, the college would benefit from having more oversight and consistency for faculty training in online pedagogy, particularly for those faculty who were trained several years ago. Finding ways to encourage more students to take the online training course prior to taking online courses would also support success strategies.



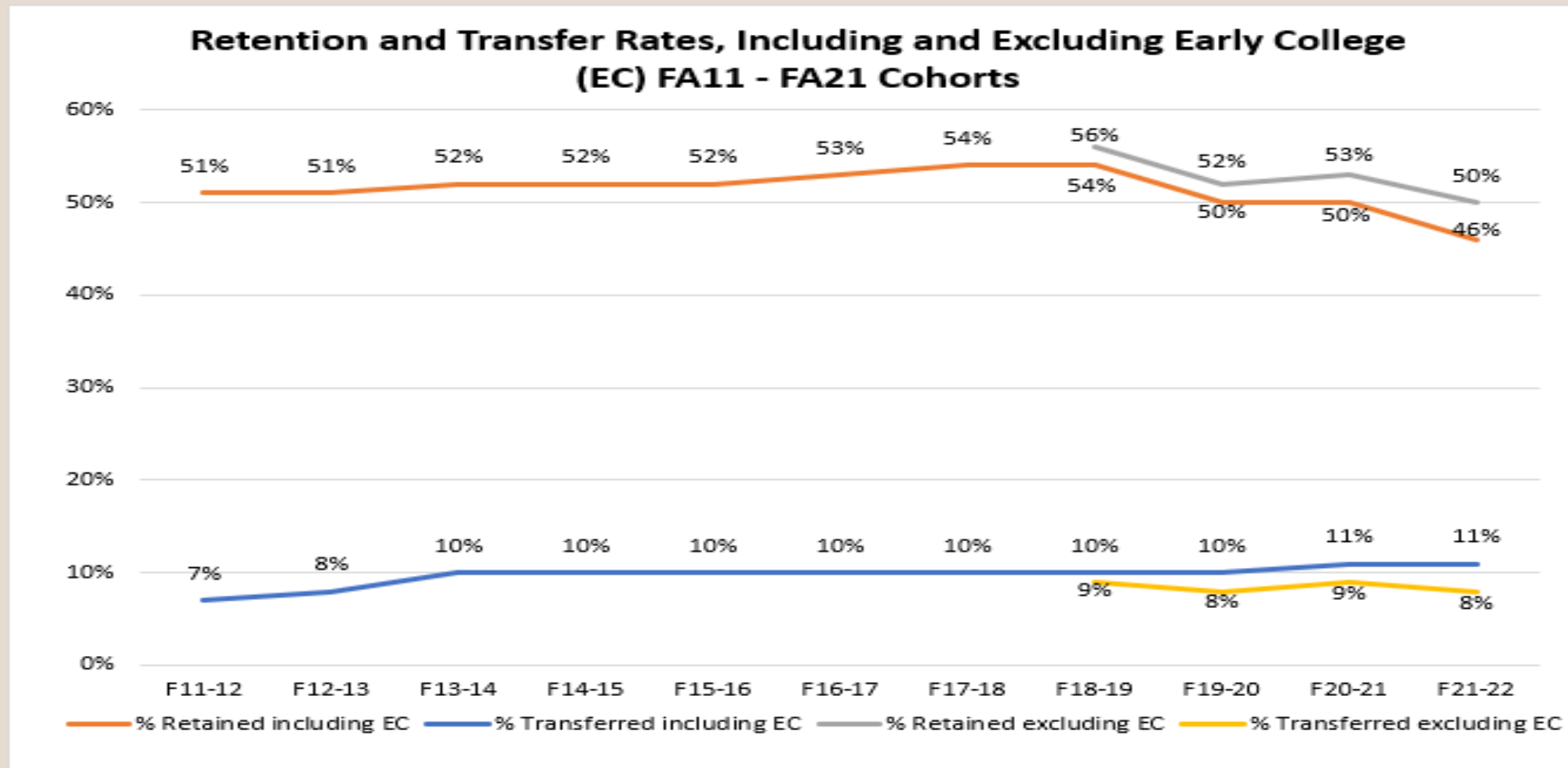
Consistent SLOs

- Some courses, such as English 101 and 102, do not have consistent course-level SLOs. This needs to be corrected. More significantly, to the point of QCC's Strategic Plan, the inconsistency of SLOs could lead to inequities for students.

 Working with the faculty, work area coordinators, and Learning Council, we hope to leverage the existing governance process to develop consistent course-level SLOs.

Improve Retention

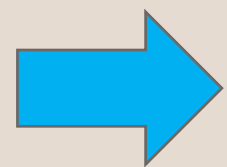
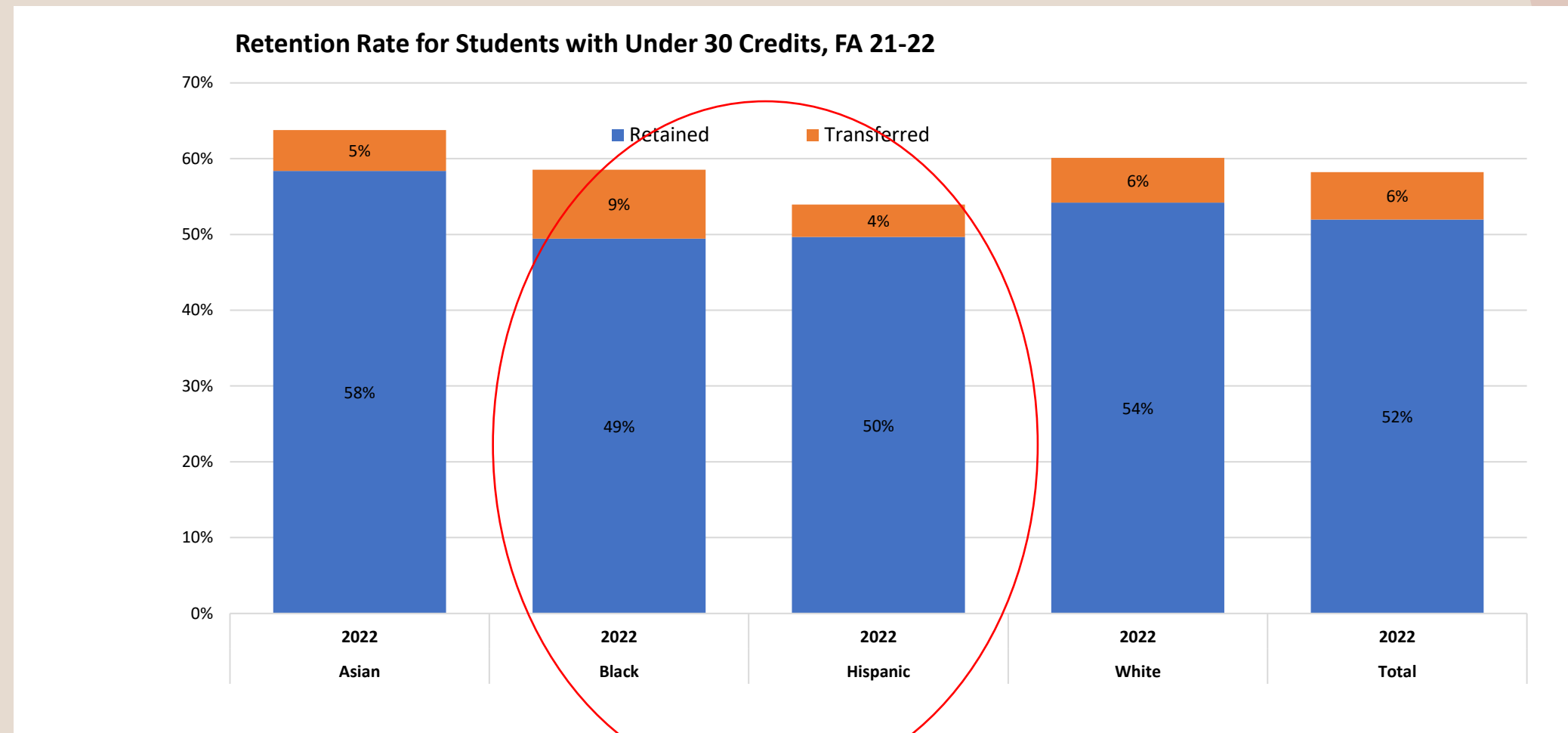
- Excluding Early College, QCC's fall 21-to-fall 22 retention was 50%

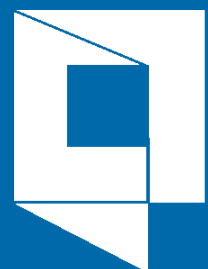

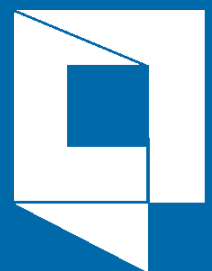

MassReconnect & Nursing Scholarship Common Eligibility Requirements

To be eligible, students MUST:

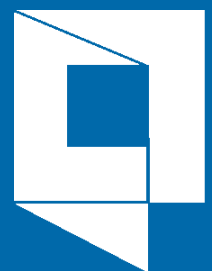
- Have graduated High School or equivalent
- Physically reside in MA for 1 year or more (before start of term), with an intent to remain in Massachusetts
- Have not earned a prior College degree (Associate's Degree or higher)
- Be a US Citizen or Eligible Non-Citizen, or an approved eligibility status designated by the Board of Higher Education
- Be enrolled in a Financial Aid eligible degree or certificate program
- Enroll in 6+ credits each semester
- Not in default of a federal or state loan or owe a refund for any previous state financial aid program
- Meet the standards for Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP)
- **There are no income requirements for these funds!**

New State Financial Aid Program Eligibility

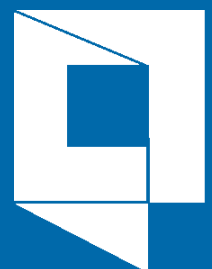
- Program Specific Eligibility Requirements:
 - MassReconnect
 - Be age 25 or older as of the first day of classes (for Spring 2024, a date of birth on or before 1/22/1999)
 - Nursing Scholarship
 - Be enrolled in an eligible Nursing or pre-Nursing degree or certificate, such as:
 - Healthcare Pre-Nursing
 - Healthcare – Practical Nursing
 - Practical Nursing Certificate (Day/Evening)
 - Nursing Assistant
 - Nurse Education (including Advanced Placement majors)
- **To be considered, students MUST complete a FAFSA annually and complete their financial aid file (including verification, if selected).**



Mass Grant Plus Expansion Eligibility

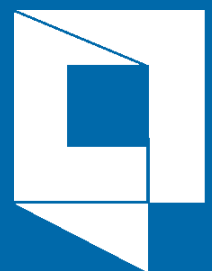
Students under the age of 25 who do not already have an associate's degree or higher. Students must complete a FAFSA and meet the standard MA aid requirements (citizenship, complete verification, meet SAP, etc.). Students may qualify if they have a Pell Grant eligible EFC or their EFC is under 15,000 or AGI is under \$100K. The award calculations for these students will differ.

- **Pell Grant Eligible EFC:**
 - Full-time and part-time students eligible
 - 6 credits or more for part-time, 12 credits or more for full-time
 - Book and supplies allowance
 - Award formula:
 - Tuition and fees + books (minus) all grant aid = Mass Grant Plus Expansion eligibility
- **Non-Pell Grant (EFC less than 15,000 or AGI under \$100K)**
 - Full-time students only
 - No book allowance
 - Award formula:
 - Tuition and fees (minus) all grant aid = Unmet Need
 - MassGrant Plus Expansion award is equal to half of student's Unmet Need



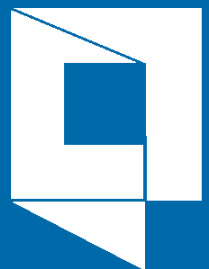
New State Grant Programs

- Students are charged for courses they enroll in at QCC.
- MassGrant Plus, MassGrant Plus Expansion, MassReconnect, and Community College Nursing Scholarship funds fill in the gap between eligible expenses and all other sources of free financial aid.
- “Last Dollar” program calculation:
 - **Eligible Expenses + Book Amount – Grant/Scholarship Aid**
- Eligible Expenses are Tuition and Required Fees
 - Health insurance fees, library fines, prior balances, etc. do not qualify.
- Semester Book Amounts are:
 - \$600 for students enrolled in 12+ credits
 - \$450 for students enrolled in 9-11 credits
 - \$300 for students enrolled in 6-8 credits



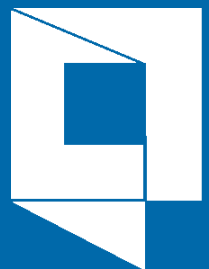
New MA Tuition Equity Law

- The new Tuition Equity law will give undocumented MA high school graduates access to in-state tuition rates at public colleges and universities in MA. It also allows these students to qualify for state-funded financial aid. A Student Application and Affidavit Form is used to determine whether students qualify as “High School Completers.”
- Who is eligible?
 - To meet “High School Completer” status, students must:
 - Have attended a MA high school for at least 3 years
 - Have received a high school diploma or a GED in MA
 - Be admitted to a MA public college or university (for in-state tuition)



New MA Tuition Equity Law

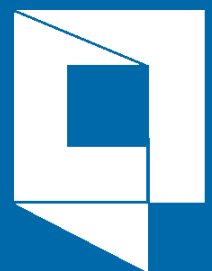
- Students must complete a Student Application and Affidavit form and submit it to the Admissions Office. Students must also provide ONE of the following documents:
 - Social Security Card;
 - Taxpayer ID number;
 - Evidence of registration with the Selective Service, if applicable; or
 - Affidavit affirming intent to apply for legal permanent residence (a green card) or U.S. citizenship within 120 days of eligibility.
- Students will need to demonstrate their eligibility only once, with no need for annual or periodic reconfirmation.



MA Tuition Equity Aid Eligibility

- State financial aid programs have been introduced in stages.
 - Phase I: Students who are considered “High School Completers” will be immediately considered for all state financial aid programs that don’t require financial need, including tuition waivers.
 - Phase II: Need-based eligibility will become available once students have completed the MASFA (Massachusetts Application for State Financial Aid) and data has been transmitted to college financial aid offices, which is expected to be received by February 2024.

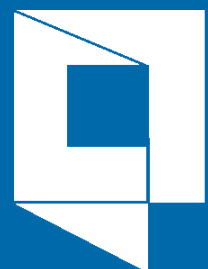

Fundraising

- **Mission**

- The QCC Foundation's mission is to raise the funds and provide the resources to support the College's mission to be the gateway to advanced educational and economic opportunities in Central MA, make impactful community connections, and create and expand on initiatives to ensure students have a successful academic experience.

- **Fundraising Goal**

- \$650,000 for FY24
- Over \$340,000 raised to date

- **How is the money raised?**

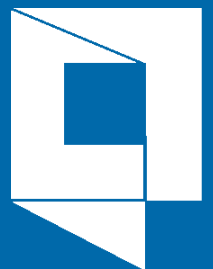
- Fall and spring appeals, campaigns such as GivingTuesday, grants
- Donors can choose what's important to them, where to direct donations
- Faculty and staff can now give through payroll deduction

Current Initiatives and Priorities

- Emergency Aid
- Scholarships
- Innovation Fund

Emergency Aid

- Raised \$67,000 in calendar year 2023; total funds since inception, \$236,000
- Students can receive a check for up to \$250 to meet basic needs such as rent, medical expenses, childcare, food, transportation, and utilities.
- If you notice a student struggling, requests for assistance can be made through emergencygrant@qcc.mass.edu or the Student Resource Referral Form (Frequently Used Forms, then Student Reports)



Scholarships

- Awarded over \$350,000 in scholarships FY23
- Over 60 scholarship funds
- One online application that auto-applies students to the ones they are eligible for
- At least a half-dozen scholarships that ALL students are eligible for



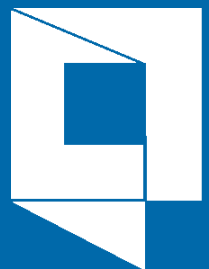

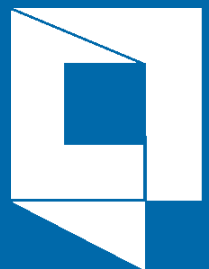

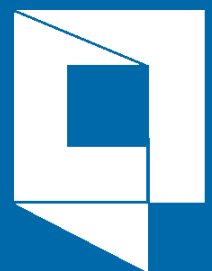
- Supports creative projects, pilot programs and academic strategies to support student success and engagement and must have a direct impact on students

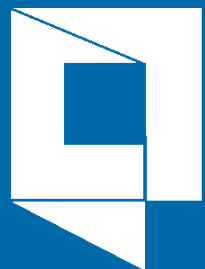

- **What is a grant?**

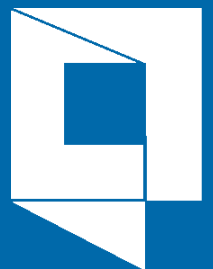
- External funding support from local, state or federal government, corporations, and foundations awarded to an approved entity to carry out a specific project or activity.

- **Why are grants important to QCC?**

- Scale existing programs; develop new academic and service programs; provide new educational opportunities; improve teaching and access to classroom resources; promote and enhance diversity; support student engagement and retention; improve infrastructure; provide workforce development training for Worcester's population; provide special and enhanced services to underserved and underrepresented populations; research.

Misconceptions about Grants

- Grants are a primary source of revenue
- We can use grant funds to address budget deficits
- We can fully sustain programs and initiatives with grants
- Apply for grants and our problems will be solved!

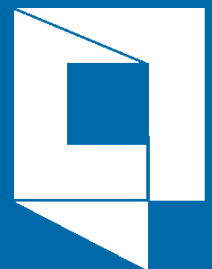

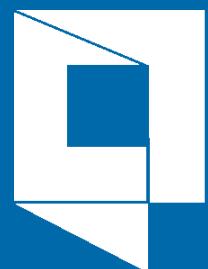
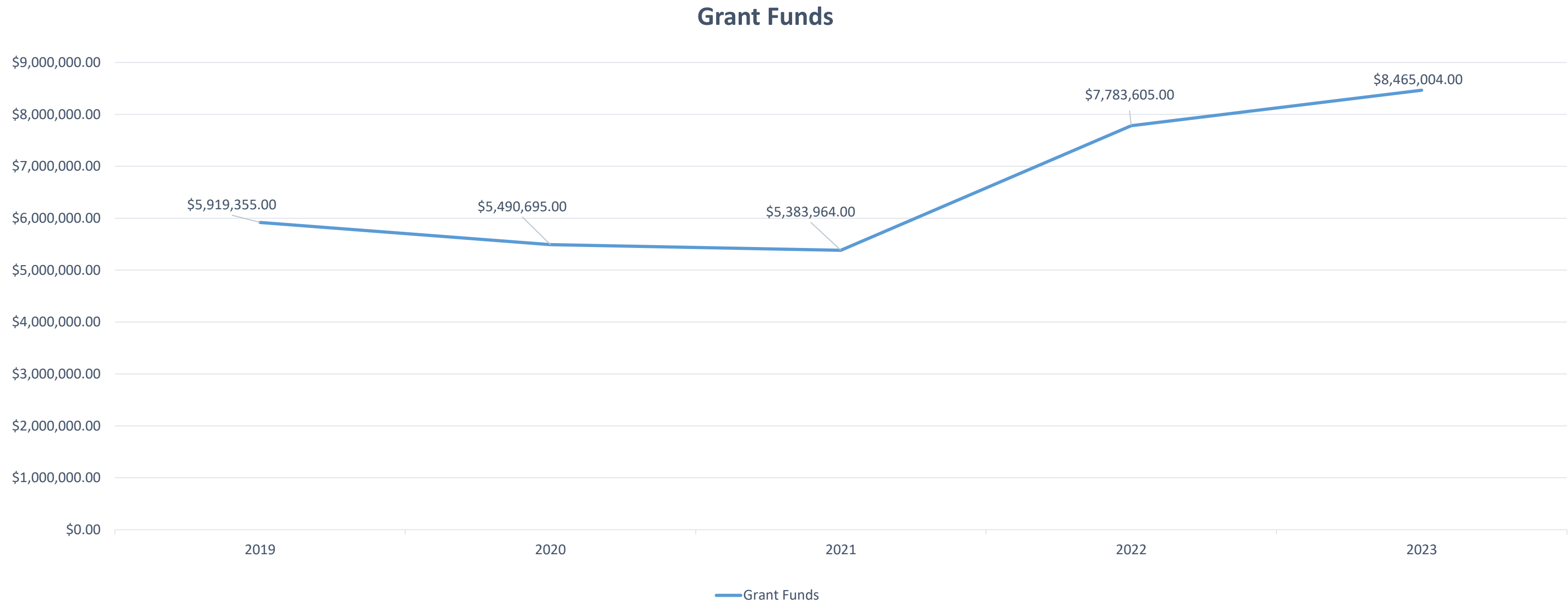

FY 2023 Grants

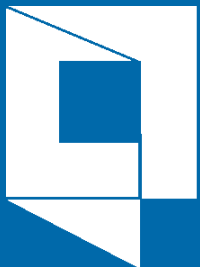
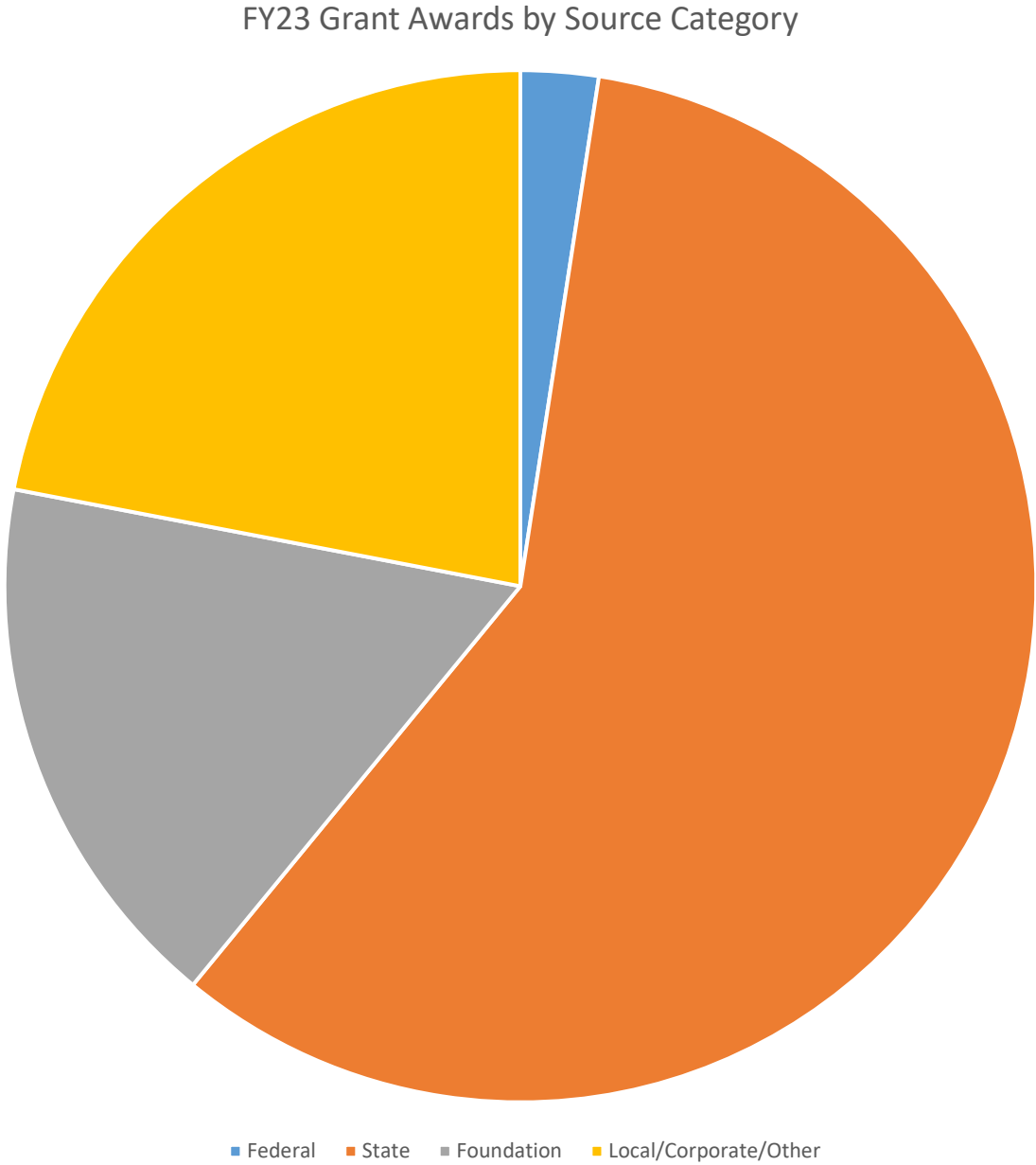
- **46 proposals** were submitted to Federal and State Governments, Foundations, and local/corporate grantors
- **Priority was given to:** student support services (food pantry services, counseling center, student emergency aid fund), adult basic education, early childhood education, and workforce development.
- **41 proposals were funded for over \$8.4 million**
- **Over 6,500** students will be served with this grant funding

Grant Funds 2019-2023



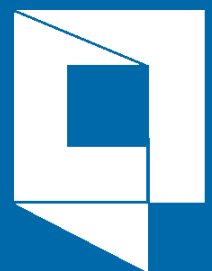
